



Tertiary League Frequently Asked Questions

Do I need to sign up somewhere? Where do I sign up?

You don't need to sign up anywhere to compete in this league. You complete the shoot following the prescribed rules. Because these are distance shoots, you must belong to an archery club as this is where you will likely be shooting the round. You need a witness for your scoresheet. Your results should come using the Results template (<u>found here</u>) with all the details filled in for each archer.

Does my scoresheet have to be signed by another tertiary student?

No, it just needs to be signed by another archer. A club archer can sign it for you as your witness. You do need an archer to witness your scoring though.

Can I still compete if my club is not organising a shoot for this?

Absolutely! As long as you have a witness and you set up the shoot correctly, you can shoot this as an individual archer. In this instance, you can send a photo of your scoresheet, rather than using the whole Results template.

If I am only studying for half a year, can I shoot in the tertiary league for the whole year?

You are only a current student for the half year that you are studying. You can shoot the rounds across the whole year, but you can only submit scores for the terms where you are studying.

Can I compete in the tertiary league if I am a part-time student?

Yes, you can. UTSNZ eligibility criteria state that a participant must be a currently enrolled student, which could be full-time or part-time study including doing a single paper.

If I change bow types, does that make me a Novice with my new bow?

Sorry, no. The underlying principles of shooting are the same regardless of bow type. Whilst it takes a little time to adjust to the new technique for that bow, it does not make you a beginner archer.











Can I shoot in more than one Division?

You can shoot in as many different bow-type divisions as you like (*Barebow, Compound, Recurve*), as long as you are at the same level for all entries (*Novice, Development, Open*).

Can I go up a level early?

If you want to go up early and compete at a higher level, you can (*Novice to Development, Development to Open*), but you stay up if you do.
