


# 2023 ANNUAL REPORT





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# **MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR**

The Board extends its gratitude to the eight universities who make up the membership of UTSNZ and who we ultimately serve in the work that we do. We continue to strongly believe that UTSNZ provides a valuable offering to its members, and we are thankful for the open and respectful relationships between UTSNZ and each university. A special thank you to our university sport managers and staff, national sporting organisation partners and other stakeholders that work alongside us to deliver high quality competitive events. This collective effort ensures we continue to meet the needs and expectations of our students.

In 2023, UTSNZ concentrated on setting up the organisation for long-term success and viability. Taking into account our ambitious strategic plan, the Board extensively deliberated on and discussed the organisation's future and strategies. We aimed to ensure sustainability amid fiscal challenges faced by universities, our limited revenue sources, and the growing cost-of-living pressures on students.

A significant focus was placed on financial sustainability, resulting in a comprehensive review of membership fees and structure. UTSNZ had not increased its membership fees since inception and has operated on a conservative budget. After extensive consultation with members, the Board increased fees to bolster the financial sustainability of the organisation and to accurately reflect cost increases, and has committed to annual fee reviews. Diversification of financial partnerships remains a priority crucial to UTSNZ's growth in profile, relevance, and sustainability. We extend our heartfelt thanks to our financial supporters for their invaluable contributions in 2023.

With funding support from Sport New Zealand, UTSNZ also explored avenues to provide value to the vocational education sector. The first phase of this exploration provided significant insights, and we hope for increased collaboration with this sector in the future.

The current Board consists of eight members, two of whom are university student representatives. The Board comprises of a representative from four of the eight Universities and is 50% female. In 2023, Connor Mills, student representative from AUT, was welcomed to the Board. We extend our gratitude to Jason Nel, our previous student representative who resigned from the Board to take up work commitments. It is fulfilling to see the transition of our students into their professional careers and knowing the benefit they received from committing to the challenging position of a governance role. Further valuable student voice is received from the Student Athlete Commission, made up from a representative from each member University.

Additionally, the Board reviewed its skills matrix to ensure that the expertise at Board level aligns with the strategic direction of the organisation, and that it is equipped to support the operations and aspirational strategic targets the organisation has set for itself. Following an update to the skills matrix, the Board commenced recruitment for a new co-opted Board member to join the team and are delighted that Kathryn Irving has been appointed to the Board, attending the first meeting of the Board in 2024. Kathryn brings over 15 years of extensive experience in sports policy, marketing, and commercialisation, enhancing the Board's capabilities.

We extend sincere thanks to Sarah Anderson and Tiwai Wilson for their ongoing commitment and exemplary work in delivering UTSNZ's operations and vision. Their expertise and enthusiasm are integral to UTSNZ's success, and we are immensely grateful for their service. We also thank the staff and students from our member organisations for their essential contributions, ensuring that UTSNZ remains relevant and valuable.

It is a privilege to serve as Chair of the Board of UTSNZ for another year. UTSNZ is a fantastic organisation to be involved in, and the Board is a wonderful group of individuals dedicated to steering the organisation into the future. We remain steadfast in our commitment to making a positive difference in the lives of tertiary students through participation in sport and sporting opportunities. I look forward to working with the Board members and staff to further enhance the UTSNZ offering and service to its community in 2024 and beyond.

In terms of victories, the University of Canterbury's triumph in securing both the National Tertiary Championship Shield and Te Kaitiaki, the national Spirit Award, in 2023 (in UC's 150th year) was nothing short of legendary. In addition to results, also rewarding is the sense of social cohesion and connectedness that radiates from UTSNZ events and initiatives. Beyond event titles and medals, the events clearly help to forge bonds and friendships, uniting us all in a shared passion for sport. 

Massey University representative Heinz Fellerhoff, acting Treasurer was ratified at the 2023 AGM in May, alongside new student Board representative Connor Mills.






# STUDENT ATHLETE COMMISSION








UTSNZ is a member of FISU and FISU Oceania. FISU provides international opportunities for student athletes and volunteers. The FISU event calendar alternates between World University Games (odd years) and World University Championships (even years). Annually and bi-annually FISU also host University World Cups which are single-sport events contested by university teams (Football, 3x3).

#### **WORLD UNIVERSITY GAMES - SUMMER**

2023 was a World University Games year, however UTSNZ made the official decision at the end of 2022 not to send a New Zealand delegation to the Chengdu Games that were scheduled to take place in China from July 28 to August 8. The decision was based on the financial, travel and health risks to the New Zealand student athletes and the New Zealand delegation.

Participation of the University of Auckland's football team at the FISU University Football World Cup in Jinjiang, China, not only brought pride to the institution but also served as a transformative experience for both the players and the management team, fostering personal growth and development.

Over 10 days, the University of Auckland men's team played four matches against Universities from Spain, Uruguay, Croatia and Romania. Each match was tightly contested with UoA finishing the tournament in 11th position overall.




### **BROADCAST**

Total viewership across the seven sports was 45,721.


The **average number** of views across all events within the series was **6532 per championship**.




The majority of viewers were aged between 18-24-years (49%), followed by a significant number of viewers aged between 25-34-years (24%).



Futsal was viewed by the widest range of age groups (13-17 up to 65+), with 3x3 and Badminton primarily watched by younger age groups (18-24 and 25-34 year olds).



Overall, 65% of total viewers were male vs 35% female. Across all sports, with the exception of Netball, there were significantly more male viewers than female viewers. Whilst female viewers were less in number than males, female viewers tended to watch for a longer duration than males.

# WELLBEING

### **STAFF**

In 2023, UTSNZ announced and established the inaugural New Zealand Tertiary Recreation Awards to be run in conjunction with the New Zealand Tertiary Recreation Conference (NZTRC). The NZTRC is held annually, uniting tertiary recreation, sport and fitness administrators and managers for networking opportunities and conversations surrounding issues that drive the university and tertiary sector. In 2023 the conference was hosted by Lincoln University, from 29 November - 1 December.

The inaugural awards launched with four categories including a **Campus Impact Award**, **Innovation Award**, **Community Partnership Award** and **Service to Recreation Award**.

The Awards provide not only a chance to celebrate success, but also an opportunity to share winners' stories, showcase staff achievements and give nominees the chance to inspire and be inspired by their peers, enhancing staff well-being.



# TREASURER'S REPORT

UTSNZ navigated a challenging financial landscape in 2023, marked by limited funding sources. Despite this, over \$80,000 was secured from non-university membership fee sources, demonstrating enhancements in financial sustainability. UTSNZ continues to collaborate with key stakeholders and delivery partners which has resulted in a strong year of involvement with and contribution to tertiary sport.

In terms of financial performance, UTSNZ achieved a surplus of \$2,000 in 2023, slightly lower than 2022's performance but closely aligned with the budgeted surplus of \$3,200. This achievement stemmed from increased revenue and prudent cost management strategies, ensuring controlled spending. Notably, revenue saw a \$15,000 increase compared to 2022, primarily due to significant contributions from partners such as \$40,000 from Sport NZ. These additional revenues were fully allocated to activities delivered within 2023, as well as UTSNZ investigation into ways to offer value to the vocational education sector.

Operating costs rose to \$284,700, reflecting inflationary pressures and new activities associated with increased non-membership-related funding.

We extend appreciation to Sarah Anderson, Executive Director, and Tiwai Wilson, Marketing and Events Manager, for their meticulous financial management. The consistent effort and discipline of our team, coupled with regular oversight by the Board and Treasury, contributed to our operational performance in 2023.

While UTSNZ's overall financial position remains relatively stable compared to 2022, with increased liquid assets balanced by higher liabilities, it's worth noting that we have no loans or significant borrowings apart from business credit card debt and trade payables. This places us in a reasonably secure financial stance.

Looking ahead, projections indicate potential financial strain due to inflation outpacing membership fee increases, stagnant fees for several years, and limited sector funding. The Board is actively exploring strategies to address these challenges, aiming to secure adequate funding to sustain UTSNZ's mission and strategic objectives.
